Instrument Rating

After achieving the Private or Commercial Licence, pilots often seek to improve their skills or better their employment prospects by adding an Instrument Rating. The instrument rated pilot can conduct flying operations in a single or multi engine aircraft under the Instrument Flight Rules (IFR), in conditions that would make visual flying (VFR) impractical. Pilots will learn the theory and regulations of the IFR, flight planning, en-route procedures and all instrument approach procedures such as the RNAV GPS and ILS approach.

PART TIME:	As required (progress at your own pace)
PRE-REQUISITES:	Private Pilot Licence, SEA / MEA Class Rating, Instrument Rating Exam (IREX) Passed
PRIVILEGES:	Act as pilot in command of a single or multi engine aircraft operating under the IFR Fly at night under the IFR or VFR Conduct Instrument Approaches to land (based on endorsements issued) Fly single pilot IFR operations Carry out Visual Circling after completing an Instrument Approach to land
MILESTONES:	First flight in actual instrument conditions
